# OPEN YOUR EYES TO ART





### Famous Deaf Artists

Are you interested in learning more about Deaf Artists? In the Learning Center we have a book titled, <u>Deaf Artists in America Colonial to Contemporary</u>, written by Deborah M. Sonnenstrahl.

Dr. Sonnenstrahl is Deaf and an Artist as well as an author. Her book depicts Deaf artists' lives from the 17th century to the present. She not only tells you about the artists' lives but shows examples of their works of art. A few examples to pique your curiosity are as follows;

John Brewster - Was born deaf in Hampton, Connecticut in the year 1766. He became one of the best painter who created beautiful images of American people of Post-Revolutionary America.

Boy Holding a Book 1810

N. Hillis Arnold - Was born in North Dakota in 1906, and became deaf at the age of 6 months due to spinal meningitis. As a sculptor, he would work in any material from wood to stone to resin. He believed that his deafness made his work better because he was not distracted.

Maggie Lee Sayre - Was born deaf in 1920 near Paducah, Kentucky. She lived 51 years of her life on a river houseboat on the Ohio and Tennessee rivers. Her family made a living fishing throughout Kentucky and Tennessee. She took photographs that were treasured for their depiction of river life and culture in the 1930s.

#### Famous Deaf Artists - cont'd

Tony Landon McGregor - Was born in Garland, Texas in 1958. He became deaf around 18 months old from hereditary causes. As a boy, he was heavily involved in art, and studied drawing and painting. Went to Gallaudet University but transferred to University of Texas where he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts. He has been a computer artist, a gourd carver and a printmaker.

<u>Chuck Baird</u> - Was born deaf in 1947 in Kansas City. He began his art career by painting sets for the National Theater of the Deaf (NTD). He graduated from RIT/NTID with a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts in 1974. He was one of the founding artists of the Deaf View Image Arts. He passed away recently at the age of 64 on February 10th after a four-year battle with cancer.

There are many more Deaf artists that you can learn about in this book so check it out, it just may inspire **YOU** to try your hand at art.

### Surrealism

Surrealism is a style in art and literature in the 1920s in which ideas, images, and objects are combined in a strange way, like in a dream.

Artists include Salvador Dali, Frida Kahlo, Henri Matisse, and Marc Chagall.


Close your eyes and picture yourself going on a journey to a fictional place. Open your eyes and imagine that this is where you arrived.

Salvador Dali's The Persistence of Memory







## Read the Most from Coast to Coast Accelerated Reader Day

Students in grades 1st to 12th participated in one-day Accelerated Reader - Read Across America event on March 2nd.
