Inspired by her children's needs and challenges, Rachel, and her sister Emilie Brown, created the Signing Time Series, the Baby Signing Time Series, and most recently their science and sign language series, Rachel & The TreeSchoolers.

In July 2016, The Signing Time Foundation launched an online, American Sign Language curriculum called, "Sign It: ASL Made Easy" www.SignItASL. com. "Sign It" is a 2.5 million dollar project which will provides American Sign Language lessons, free of charge, to families who have a deaf child age 0-3 through www.MyDeafChild.org.

As the President of The Signing Time Foundation, Rachel is a mentor, advocate and role model for countless families raising children with disabilities. Rachel, her husband Aaron, and their daughter Lucy live in Salt Lake City, Utah. Leah Coleman lives in Rochester, New York where she is a junior, majoring in Industrial Design, at The Rochester Institute of Technology.
