Exploring the Five Areas of Montessori Curriculum

- Practical Life: Here the children develop order, coordination, concentration, and independence. These include the care of self, care of the environment and grace and courtesy.
- 2. Sensorial Area: The sensorial materials were designed to help the child to focus attention on the physical world exploring each of the senses with small changes to the characteristics of objects. Each piece of material is self-correcting and allows the child to make observant assessments of their work.
- 3. Language: Children three to six years of age are in a 'sensitive period' for absorbing language. The Montessori environment is rich in oral language, listening to stories, reciting poems, singing and talking to others. Pre-reading activities along with the use of concrete materials assist in the development of writing and lead to reading.
- 4. Math: The importance of one's sense of order is emphasized in the development of the mathematical mind. Manipulative materials are used to allow children to discover abstract mathematical ideas through concrete models.
- 5. Cultural and Science: In this area, children learn about science concepts in sensorial ways to provide real-life experiences. They also develop a global perspective of people and their cultures.
